
Requiem for All Saints

Bach St. Mark Passion

Devotees of Bach's music—and really, what organists aren't, to some degree?—may well be aware of the "lost" Passions believed to have been written by the master. Contemporary or early retrospective accounts of his life and music attested to his having written as many as five passion-settings, but by the time his music was being published only the St. John and St. Matthew versions were available to editors.

Already by the mid-19th century, when the great Bach-Gesellschaft edition was being compiled, it was very plausibly theorized that one of these, a St. Mark Passion, was closely based on Cantata 198, a piece from 1727 marking the death of Christiane Eberhardine, Queen of Poland and Electress of Saxony. The printed libretto of a St. Mark Passion performed in Leipzig in 1731 makes clear that it was of quite modest proportions: apart from the recitative that conveys the story, the piece was comprised of only two principal choruses, six arias, and an unusually large number of chorales. The choruses and three of the aria texts in the libretto turn out to correspond perfectly in metre and scansion to movements from the mourning-cantata, and details somehow preserved concerning the scoring of the lost St Mark confirm that it corresponds precisely to the idiosyncratic scoring of Cantata 198—particularly its addition of two violas da gamba and two lutes to the usual ensemble of strings andwinds.

These traces of evidence have led to various attempts at reconstruction across the last century. The greatest gap in the materials is, of course, the recitative through which the narrative would've taken place; in the surviving Passions, the music for the Evangelist and Jesus (as well as the other subidiary characters) is so perfectly wrought and so distinctive that imagining another hand furnishing this music in Bach's stead would be impossible, or at least unwise.

This Spring, Pittsburgh's Chatham Baroque are presenting a new, hybrid realization of this illusory work, edited by Malcolm Bruno, in which the surviving musical components are united, not with alsoran recitative, but with a dramatic spoken rendering of the Gospel text. The resulting piece is, perhaps, more theatrical than we are accustomed to Bach's Passions being, but also more comprehensible, for an English-speaking audience, since the narrative is given in English, with the musical commentary (choruses, arias, etc) retaining the German original. In addition to Chatham Baroque, the performers

include the New York City-based ensemble The Sebastians, led by Jeffrey Grossman, singers Pascale Beaudin, Cody Bowers, James Reese, and Jonathan Woody, and the acclaimed British stage-actor Joseph Marcell as the Narrator.

The Pittsburgh performance is Friday, April 11, at 7:30 p.m., at the Carnegie Music Hall in Oakland. Tickets are already on sale, through the Chatham Baroque website (www.chathambaroque.org), with an early-bird discount in place through March 28. Why not organize a concert outing for your choir, or musical friends, to hear this lost-and-found-again work for the first time?
